## The First Scout Stamps

In 1907, Robert Baden-Powell, a decorated British veteran of the Boer War founded the **Scouting Movement**, which in the U.S. was incorporated as the **Boy Scouts of America** by William D. Boyce on February 8, 1910. Baden-Powell, together with his wife and sister founded the **Girl Guides Movement** in 1910 to provide similar opportunities to young women, and the **Girl Scouts of the USA** was founded by Juliet Gordon Low on March 12, 1912. It is exciting to note that both of these organizations will celebrate their founding in the United States in the next few years.

How did the idea of scouting begin? It actually predates by almost a decade Baden-Powell's Scouting Movement. During the late 1800's, a bitter conflict between British colonists and the Boers, who were descendants of Dutch colonists, erupted in southern Africa. Philatelically, this is a fascinating area of study, because there were several independent states established by the Boers, all of which ultimately were incorporated into the Union of South Africa following the British victory. The origin of the idea of scouting for young men and the first stamps related to that all come from the Boer siege of a small town called Mafeking.

Baden-Powell and 1,500 troops had been sent to Mafeking, a key town on the railroad north from Capetown, as a diversion to attract Boer troops away from an invasion of Natal colony. In other words, the siege, which lasted from October 14, 1899 to May 16, 1900, was planned by the besieged! The uncertain thing about sieges, however, is their duration, and stamps for use in and around Mafeking were in short supply, as were currency banknotes.

Initially, this problem was solved by overprinting stocks of existing stamps for the Cape of Good Hope colony and the Bechuanaland Protectorate (overprinted on British stamps) with the words "MAFEKING BESIEGED." Those were used only as long as existing stocks permitted, and by April, 1900 there was a need to print stamps. The scarcity of materials resulted in the ingenious use of glass printing plates and chemically treated ordinary papers that produced both stamps and a required banknote by what we now know as the "blueprint" process.

Three different stamps were printed in sheets of 12 (shown below at right), and used examples are all postmarked in April or May. A large and small format, featured Colonel Baden-Powell. The third showed a 12-year old military cadet, Warner Goodyear, riding a bicycle used for mail delivery within the town and nearby surrounding areas. The Mafeking cadet corps, including boys as young as 9, conducted many basic and essential services during the siege.



Initially, Queen Victoria was "not amused" that postage stamps had been issued without her portrait, but she later knighted Baden-Powell. The energetic cadets displayed heroism and fortitude during the siege and were part of Baden-Powell's inspiration to found the Scouting Movement.

## New Machins Will Be Hard To Remove

Recent articles in *Linn's Stamp News* gave warning of problems for stamp soakers that might even eclipse the problems found with current U.S. stamps. Royal Mail, the British government postal agency, announced new security measures on its Machin definitive stamps. For more information about the history of this beautiful stamp issue, see Charlie Wade's article in the March 2009 issue of the KPS Newsletter.

In addition to security overprints on the Machin definitives, Royal Mail added another feature – curved cuts in the stamp paper designed to make stamp removal next to impossible without tearing.



These images are from the web site of Ian Norvic, who has a great discussion and illustrations of the new features – [www.norvic-philatelics.co.uk](http://www.norvic-philatelics.co.uk). On the first class stamp, the cuts can be seen just above and below the "1<sup>st</sup>" and on the one pound stamp, the cuts are centered above and below the "1." Issued beginning on February 17, the cuts appear on the most common stamps (1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> denominated) and on the pound values.

There is hope, and the Machin Mania blog site – <http://machinmania.blogspot.com> – has postings that suggest Ronson brand lighter fluid may work.
